OVERVIEW

This Selection Policy outlines the process by which the National Ice Skating Association of UK Ltd trading as British Ice Skating (“**BIS**”) will determine its nominations for Team GB at the Beijing 2022 Olympic Winter Games (the “**Games**”) for Speed Skating. In all cases, selection by BIS represents a nomination to the British Olympic Association (“**BOA**”) for their ratification and will be conditional on skaters signing the BOA Team Members’ Agreement (“**TMA**”) as well as all other requirements set out in this policy. The final decision regarding selection for the Games lies with the BOA.

BIS’s strategic aim is to maximise the team’s potential to win medals at both Beijing and future Olympic Games. The policy has therefore been structured to nominate a team with this aim in mind.

This policy outlines the eligibility requirements that apply to all skaters seeking nomination to the BOA and then details the discipline specific selection requirements.

PART A: GENERAL PRINCIPLES

The below principles apply to all BIS disciplines (Long Track, Short Track, Figure Skating).

1. Eligibility

To be considered for nomination to the BOA, skaters must:

- 1.1. Meet the BOA’s, ISU’s and the International Olympic Committee’s eligibility requirements to compete for Team GB at the Games (including holding a full British passport valid for at least 6 months after the Games);
- 1.2. Be a member of British Ice Skating (BIS);
- 1.3. Not be serving a ban from competition as a result of being found guilty of a doping offence or other breach of ethical conduct, nor be in receipt of a lifetime funding ban from UK Sport;
- 1.4. Have signed or be prepared to sign the BOA’s Team Member’s Agreement;
- 1.5. Have signed the BIS GB Performance Squad Athlete Agreement;
- 1.6. Have reached the minimum Senior age for international competitions;
- 1.7. Have achieved the qualification standards for their discipline as referred to in Schedule 1, which refer both to the IOC/ISU qualification standards for the Games as well as the enhanced BOA standards for the Games; and
- 1.8. Fulfil any discipline specific eligibility requirements specified for Figure Skating, Short Track Speed Skating and Speed Skating respectively

2. Objective of Policy

- 2.1. Unless stated otherwise in the discipline-specific section of this policy, all selection decisions made pursuant to this policy shall be taken with a view to maximising the prospects of securing medals at the Games. In the event that the relevant Selection Panel considers that there is no reasonable prospect of an athlete(s) competing for a medal at the Games, it shall be entitled to consider such athlete's developmental opportunities from participation in the Beijing 2022 Olympic Winter Games.

3. Selection Panels, Criteria and Process

Selection Panel

- 3.1. The composition of the Selection Panels shall be as set out in Part B for each discipline. Each Panel shall ensure that it has at least one observer in attendance, who will, if possible, be from another sport.

De-selection

- 3.2. The BOA will make formal entries with the Beijing Organising Committee at the Delegation Registration Meeting (DRM) in advance of the Sport Entries deadline of 24 January 2022. Prior to the date of the DRM, BIS retains the right to deselect an athlete pursuant to this policy, in the event that (a) such athlete(s) is in breach of, or has failed to adhere to all, provisions within this policy or any agreement referred to in this policy (i.e. the BOA Team Member's Agreement or the BIS GB Performance Squad Athlete Agreement); or (b) the athlete(s) suffers an injury or illness which leads the Selection Panel to conclude in their reasonable opinion that such athlete(s) will not be able to perform to the best of their ability at the Games.
- 3.3. Skaters must demonstrate an uncompromised commitment to training preparation for peak performance at the Games, as determined by their Coach and approved by the BIS Performance and Talent Manager. If for any reason a skater(s) is unable or unwilling to fulfil this commitment, they may be withdrawn from the team following consultation with the BOA.
- 3.4. Team members are expected to attend all programmed activities in preparation camps on a full-time basis. Failure to attend could result in non-selection or withdrawal from the team following consultation with the BOA. Skaters are not permitted to undertake any activities that are not directly relevant to the preparation camp, this includes external media, sponsorship or social activities, without the permission of BIS.
- 3.5. Skaters may not take holidays or breaks from training between October 2021 and the Olympic Games 2022 without written approval from BIS.
- 3.6. The nomination of a replacement athlete must also conform to this selection policy and must be an individual who has been named on the long list.

- 3.7. After the DRM has been completed, de-selection and selection of a replacement athlete is only allowed in accordance with the IOC's Late Athlete Replacement Policy (or any revised or amended IOC policy dealing with athlete replacement). This primarily provides for, but is not limited to, replacement in the case of injury and/or illness.
- 3.8. A breach of the BIS GB Performance Squad Athlete Agreement or BOA Team Member's Agreement may result in de-selection from the team.

4. Mitigating Circumstances

- 4.1. Should an athlete miss an event or fall ill during, or prior to, the 2021-22 Olympic qualification process the Panel may, at its absolute discretion, provide an opportunity for such an athlete to compete and challenge for selection where evidence of illness (preferably certified by a Doctor), or any other mitigating circumstance, is presented to the Panel prior to the commencement of the selection procedure. In such circumstances full details of all evidence relied upon must be provided to the Panel no later than 24 hours prior to the selection meeting. The Panel may have regard, in such circumstances, to all information it reasonably regards as relevant, including past performances, training data and any medical evidence obtained by BIS. The Panel's decision in respect of any such application is final.

5. Appeals

- 5.1. Prior to DRM, any athletes may appeal their non-nomination or de-selection under this Selection Policy after being notified of any selection decision according to the procedure laid out in the "BIS Selection Appeals Policy". Athletes wishing to seek advice regarding the appeals process are advised to contact the British Athletes Commission (BAC) at www.britishathletes.org.
- 5.2. In the event that the BOA refuses to ratify a nomination by the Panel, the athlete may appeal this decision in accordance with any relevant BOA's Appeals Policy which can be provided upon request.

6. Amendments

- 6.1. BIS reserves the right to amend this Selection Policy at its sole discretion and will make any amended version publicly available (including the date on which any amendment was made) at www.iceskating.org.uk
- 6.2. The criteria outlined in this document may be amended by the BIS in the event that COVID-19 materially impacts the qualification timeline or pathway in any respect

7. Confidentiality

- 7.1. Athletes and officials must not disclose any information regarding any selection decisions or appeals until such information is publicly announced or disclosed by the BOA or BIS.

8. Miscellaneous Provisions

- 8.1. All skaters and coaches are expected to complete a Selection Acceptance Form to confirm that they will be available to participate in the Olympic Games 2022, by the prescribed deadline. Failure to do so will be interpreted as non-availability by BIS.
- 8.2. All team members must comply with ISU, IOC and BOA competition and training kit regulations whilst competing at the Olympic Games 2022.
- 8.3. All team members are expected to abide by the media protocols of the BOA. Skater(s) may not speak to the media about anything other than their own personal performances.

PART B: DISCIPLINE-SPECIFIC PROVISIONS

B1: SHORT TRACK SPEED SKATING

1. Specific Eligibility Criteria

To be considered for nomination by BIS to the BOA for selection, athlete must:

- 1.1. Have gained qualification on to the 2021/22 BIS Performance Squad at the BIS STSS Performance Event in August 2021
- 1.2. Fulfil the Olympic Qualifying Requirements in accordance with schedules 1A, outlined below.

2. Selection meetings and process

- 2.1. The team will be selected for nomination by the Selection Panel (the “**Panel**”) during a selection meeting on 14th December 2021.
- 2.2. The Panel for the selection meeting shall comprise:

Voting members

- (a) Short Track Technical Advisory Committee Chair;
- (b) British Ice Skating Honorary Short Track Head Coach;
- (c) British Ice Skating Performance and Talent Manager;

Non-voting members

- (d) Legal representative (Who will chair the meeting);
- (e) Independent member from an outside sporting body; and
- (f) Note-takers etc. as required.

3. Selection Criteria

Nominations for individuals shall be prioritised over nominations for relay teams, pursuant to the process set out below.

Individual

- 3.1. Securing a quota place does not automatically secure nomination for selection for an athlete. The selection panel shall nominate for selection those athletes who, in their discretion, represent the best prospects for winning a medal at the Games. In arriving at their decision, the selection panel shall use the following process according to the number of GBR quota place.

3.2. One Quota Place

- 3.2.1. Highest world ranked athlete from any of the individual distances where a quota place is available

3.3. Two Quota Places

- 3.3.1. First quota place - Highest world ranked athlete from any of the individual distances where a quota place is available
- 3.3.2. Allocate athlete 1 to the distance(s) in which she/he is ranked highest
- 3.3.3. Second quota place – Highest world ranked remaining athlete in all available distances
- 3.3.4. Allocate athlete 2 to the remaining distance(s) in which she/he is ranked highest

3.4. Three Quota Places

- 3.4.1. First quota place - Highest world ranked athlete from any of the individual distances where a quota place is available
- 3.4.2. Allocate athlete 1 to the distance(s) in which she/he is ranked highest
- 3.4.3. Second quota place – Highest world ranked remaining athlete in all available distances
- 3.4.4. Allocate athlete 2 to the remaining distance(s) in which she/he is ranked highest
- 3.4.5. Third quota place – Highest world ranked remaining athlete in all available distances
- 3.4.6. Allocate athlete 3 to the remaining distance(s) in which she/he is ranked highest

- 3.5. Any tie would be broken by the selection panel considering, and giving such weight as may be appropriate, to all of the following factors;

- 3.5.1. Highest ranked in any other distance(s)
- 3.5.2. Highest individual result
- 3.5.3. Overall WITTW testing result

- 3.6. Any remaining distance spot(s) not filled by clause 3.2, 3.3 and or 3.4 will be filled by an already nominated athlete from said clause. This athlete will be the highest world ranked in that particular distance, who has not already been selected for that distance.

Relay

- 3.7. Provided Team GB has achieved qualification for the relevant relay event at the Games, a team will be nominated for each of the men's 5000m, women's 3000m and mixed gender 2000m relay teams in accordance with the ISU/IOC entry rules for the relay events. The teams must include all athletes already nominated for individual 500m, 1000m and 1500m events, which reflects the priority given to the nomination of individual skaters over relay team(s).
- 3.8. Where single - gender relay athletes are required to be nominated to fulfil the remaining team spots the following process will be in place to be selected:

- 3.8.1. Athletes will complete Relay Tests (the test consists of 7 x 1.5 laps (Men) or 4 x 1.5 laps (Women), starting every 60 seconds). Three relay tests will be held with the total time of each athlete's best two tests counted in the final ranking;
- 3.8.2. From these rankings, the highest ranked skater(s) will be selected for the remaining spot(s) as a member of the relay squad nominated to the BOA
- 3.9. The athletes to race each relay event will be selected by the Lead Coach in collaboration with all GBR coaches and Team Leader attending the Olympic Games based on their impact on medal-winning potential in relay teams, including:
 - 3.9.1. Past performances during relay events in the Olympic Qualification process.
 - 3.9.2. Top speed within pre-competition training at the Olympic Games.

Mixed Relay

Mixed gender relay skaters would be selected by;

- 3.10. Where Mixed Gender relay athletes are required to be nominated to fulfil the remaining team spots the following process will be in place to be selected:
 - 3.10.1. Athletes will complete a Mixed Gender Relay Test (the test consists of 2 x 2 Laps, starting every 80 seconds). Three Mixed Gender Relay Tests will be held with the total time of the athlete's best two tests counted in the final ranking;
 - 3.10.2. From these rankings, the highest ranked skater(s) will be selected for the remaining spot(s) as a member of the mixed gender relay nominated to the BOA
- 3.11. The athletes to race each relay event will be selected by the Lead Coach in collaboration with all GBR coaches and Team Leader attending the Olympic Games based on their impact on medal-winning potential in relay teams, including:
 - 3.11.1. Past performances during relay events in the Olympic Qualification process.
 - 3.11.2. Top speed within pre-competition training at the Olympic Games.

4. Timelines

Indicative timelines are provided below, which may be subject to change.

Jan 2022	BOA to ratify the BIS nomination and confirm athletes selected to represent Team GB, and Team Announcement to take place on agreed date

B3: LONG-TRACK SPEED SKATING

1. Speed Skating - Specific Eligibility Requirements

- 1.1. To be considered for nomination, skaters must satisfy the following:
 - 1.1.1. fulfil the Olympic Qualifying Requirements in accordance with schedule 1B, outlined below;
 - 1.1.2. fulfil the ISU Qualification System for the XXII Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022 and the IOC/ISU standards and eligibility criteria (see ISU Communication 2101, published at the latest 1st August 2021 for full details).
- 1.2. The BOA shall be allocated a quota of skaters per event based on the performances in the SOQC ISU World Cup events in 2021. This may range from zero to a maximum of 3 skaters per event (max 2 for the 10km). In addition, the Team GB Speed Skating entry may consist of a maximum of 8 men and 8 ladies.
- 1.3. To be eligible for nomination, skaters must achieve the requisite time during the period of 1st July 2021 to 12th December 2021 (the “**qualification period**”).
- 1.4. Times achieved in Salt Lake City and Calgary shall be subject to a correction factor of +2.0% for the formation of the rankings.

2. Selection meetings and process

- 2.1. The team will be selected for nomination by the Selection Panel (the “**Panel**”) during a selection meeting on or around 30th December 2021.
- 2.2. The Panel for the selection meeting shall comprise:

Voting members

- a) BIS Board member: Nominated Director – Long Track
- b) A UK Long-track official nominated by the BIS CEO; and
- c) BIS Performance and Talent Manager (Chair)

Non Voting members:

- d) Note taker
- e) At least one independent observer

3. Selection Criteria

- 3.1. The criteria for selection is different for Individual Distances, Mass Start and Team Pursuit and is outlined in paragraphs 2.5. – 2.13. Priority order for nomination will be as follows:
 - 3.1.1. Individual Distance Events shall be given highest priority;

- 3.1.2. Mass Start Events shall be given second priority;
- 3.1.3. Team Pursuit Event shall be given final priority.
- 3.2. The effect of clause 2.3. is that nominations for quota spots for individual distance events shall be made before nominations are made for mass start events, and so on.

Speed Skating Selection process – Individual Distance

Nominations for selection for each of the individual distance events shall be carried out as follows:

- 3.3. For each event in which quota places have been allocated, a ranking list shall be collated of eligible skaters' times achieved during the qualification period at ISU-recognised events and corrected in accordance with 1.4 above.
- 3.4. The first quota place in each event shall be allocated to the fastest skater in the ranking for that event, the second quota place shall be allocated to the second fastest skater in the ranking, and so on until all quota places have been filled. At the end of this process the list of provisionally selected skaters shall be drawn up, comprising of each skater who has been allocated a quota place in this step.
- 3.5. In the event that there are fewer skaters on the provisionally selected skater list than allowed by the overall maximum team size, all skaters on the list shall be transferred to the Final Selection List.
- 3.6. In the event that there are more skaters on the provisionally selected skater list than quota places qualified, the following procedure shall be followed until such time as the maximum team size allowance is met:
 - 3.6.1. Starting from the 500m and proceeding in ascending event distance order, any skater provisionally selected for the third quota place in an event, and only selected for one event, shall be removed from the provisional selection list.
 - 3.6.2. The vacated quota place may then be filled by any skater already provisionally selected for another event, but also satisfying the qualification criteria for this event. In the event that one or more skater is eligible, priority shall be given to the skater who has recorded the fastest time in the distance in which the quota spot has been vacated. In the event that no already provisionally selected skater is eligible, the quota place will remain unused.
 - 3.6.3. In the unlikely event that the team size is still too large, the process will be repeated, starting from the longest distance, with the second quota place and working back down the distances.
 - 3.6.4. At the end of this process there will be a populated Final Selection List based on the Individual Distance Events and the selection process will move to consider the Mass Start event.

Speed Skating Selection process – Mass Start Event

- 3.7. To be eligible to be selected for the mass start, a skater must have achieved a finish place in any ISU World Cup Mass Start Race during the qualification period of 16th place or better for Division A OR 5th place or better for Division B (if there is no Division B, the main event will be classed as Division A).
- 3.8. A list of all qualifying skaters shall be assembled and ranked in order of the number of ISU World Cup points achieved in any single Mass Start event during the qualification period. In case of a tie, the skater with the faster 1500m time achieved at an ISU-recognised event during the qualification period and modified according to rink (paragraph 1.4) shall be ranked higher.
- 3.9. In the event that the number of skaters in the Final Selection List, after the Individual Distance Event selection has taken place, is below the maximum team size limit, the quota places for the mass start shall be filled in order of their points ranking as described at 2.10 above and the skaters added to the Final Selection List.
- 3.10. In the event that the number of skaters in the Final Selection List is already at the maximum team size limit, then only skaters already on the Final Selection List shall be considered further in the ranking and the filling of the (remaining) quota places.

Speed Skating Selection process – Team Pursuit Events

- 3.11. Should a quota place for the Team Pursuit be achieved, the selection for the skaters to be entered for this event shall be made as follows:
 - 3.11.1. In case a Team has achieved the qualification criteria as a team (A top 5 finish in an ISU World Cup in the qualification period) then: If there are sufficient spaces on the Final Selection List after the above process has been exhausted to accommodate all members of the qualifying team, and all skaters making up that team have achieved an individual ISU Olympic Qualification time, all of the skaters making up that team shall be selected and added to the Final Selection List.
 - 3.11.2. In all other cases, the quota place shall not be used.

4. Timelines

Indicative timelines are provided below, which may be subject to change.

Schedule 1A

Olympic Qualification Requirements, Beijing 2022

SHORT TRACK SPEED SKATING

1. The maximum number of athletes per NOC is limited to five entries for men (three for NOCs without relay team) and five entries for women (three for NOCs without relay team).
2. The quota places are assigned to the NOC and not to the individual that won the quota place.
3. In the event that the NOC qualifies quota places pursuant to the qualification pathways set out in section D of the IOC/ FIS qualification document (as may be amended from time to time) ("IOC/FIS Standards"), the BOA will only accept as nominations for those quota places for individual events any athlete(s) who have achieved (as applicable) any combination of **two** results listed below within the ISU World Cup competition during the 2020/21 or 2021/22 seasons:
 - i. Top 20 finish in the 500m
 - ii. Top 20 finish in the 1000m
 - iii. Top 21 finish in the 1500m
4. If, for any reason, there are fewer than 4 World Cups in season 2020/2021 then athletes will only be required to achieve 1 x Top 20 in 500m or 1 x Top 20 in 1000m or 1 x Top 21 in 1500m finish in a World Cup to achieve the BOA standard.
5. Relays; The BOA will accept any relay places, women & men, qualified in accordance with the IOC-ISU qualification pathway, top 8 for women's & men's. The gender relays are made up of four to five individuals based on IOC-ISU individual rankings. If a nation qualifies 8 individual quota places in individual distances, then a 5th quota place will be allocated to the nation for the relay team. If these criteria are not met, then the relay team can only be comprised of 4 members.
6. Mixed Relay; The BOA will accept any mixed gender places qualified in accordance with the IOC-ISU qualification pathway, top 12. Two women and two men in IOC placings in individual events to make up the mixed gender relay team. A relay skater in the mixed gender relay must, as a minimum, make the IOC-ISU minimum standard of top 32 in the 500m & 1000m and top 36 in the 1500m individual events. Mixed Team Relay skaters will be allowed to enter individual races where quota spots are earned and the relevant criteria in paragraph 3 is satisfied. In the event that not all GB skaters have attained the IOC-ISU minimum qualification, GB will retain the quota spot if no other nations outside the top 12 have 4 qualified skaters, allowing the team to be selected.
7. The BOA will not accept as qualification for the Games places offered as Tripartite Commission Invitation places or reallocated unused quota places (i.e. handback places, wildcard places or any other quota places which have not been generated by virtue of a

direct qualification) unless agreed by the BOA to be in exceptional circumstances pursuant to the BOA Beijing 2022 OQS Policy.

8. The criteria outlined in this document may be amended by the BOA in the event that COVID-19 materially impacts the qualification timeline or pathway in any respect.
9. The BOA will consider eligible for selection athletes who have been nominated under the BIS Selection Policy for Beijing 2022 by the agreed deadline of 7th January 2022.

Schedule 1B

OLYMPIC QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS, BEIJING 2022

SKATING – SPEED SKATING

1. The maximum number of athletes per NOC is limited to ten (10) entries for men and ten (10) entries for women for all NOCs that have been allocated quota places for all events/distances, including individual, Team Pursuit and Mass Start events. For all other NOCs the limit is eight (8) men and eight (8) women.
2. There is a maximum quota per event also. This is three (3) per NOC for the 500m, the 1000m and the 1500m, two (2) for the longer distances of men's 5000m, men's 10000m and men's Mass Start and also for the women's 3000m and 5000m and women's Mass Start. There is a limit of one (1) team per NOC per gender for the Team Pursuit.
3. The quota places are assigned to the NOC and not to the individual that won the quota place.
4. Qualification places are earned based on the Special Olympic Qualification Classifications (SOQC) per event/distance resulting from the ISU World Cup Speed Skating competitions designated by the ISU (venue/date TBC in August 2021) to be held during the 2021/22 season. The SOQCs will be for 500m, 1000m, 1500m, 3000m and 5000m (women), 500m, 1000m, 1500m, 5000m and 10000m (men) as well as the Team Pursuit and Mass Start (women and men).
5. The SOQC will be calculated according to criteria based on the ISU rules for the ISU Speed Skating World Cup classification. Each SOQC will combine two sets of rankings:
 - a) a ranking according to the World Cup points earned at the designated ISU World Cup competitions; and
 - b) a ranking based on the best times per skater achieved at the designated ISU World Cup competitions.
6. To be eligible to be entered for the Beijing 2022 Olympic Winter Games within the qualifying quota places earned by an NOC, skaters must also have achieved the ISU Qualifying Times in the period between 1 July 2021 and 12 December 2021. These qualification times will be announced by the ISU no later than 1st August 2020.
7. The ISU will confirm all (provisionally) allocated quota places based on the SOQC on 24 December 2021.
8. Should quota places be achieved, in order to comply with the BOA policy of top 2/3rds finish, the BOA will consider eligible for selection those athletes who have achieved the following criteria during the qualification period of 1 July 2021 to 12 December 2021 (these criteria are in addition to any ISU stipulated criteria in point 6)
 - a) For individual distances, the skater shall have achieved the following qualification times during the qualification period stipulated in point 6. This may be in any BIS recognised competition on a 400m rink with Electronic Timing: See Table 1

Times skated at high altitude (Calgary & Salt Lake City) are subject to a 2% adjustment up.

- b) For the Mass Start: One (1) finish place in any ISU World Cup Mass Start Race during the qualification period of 16th place or better for Division A OR 5th place or better for Division B.
 - c) For the Team Pursuit: One (1) top 5 finish in an ISU World Cup.
9. BOA will not accept as qualification for Beijing 2022 any previously unallocated quota places, unless in exceptional circumstances as outlined in the BOA's OQS policy 2018-2022.
 10. The BOA will consider eligible for selection individual athletes who have been nominated under the BIS Selection Policy for Beijing 2022 by the agreed deadline of 10th January 2022.
 11. The criteria outlined in this document may be amended by the BOA in the event that COVID-19 materially impacts the qualification timeline or pathway in any respect.
